

An inner absence

Press release

A group of dynamic, young and fresh artists tackle head on the dark themes that the inner absence in us all can produce. Challenging us and forcing us to question its impact upon the self as well as society.

Lewis Swane: Considering fear as a primary aspect in practice, I use print and installation to invoke this feeling as a reaction from the audience. Using a combination of fabric and cyanotype as well as other materials, my aim is to cause discomfort to the viewer while considering their position within a work and in relation to the work.

India Potesta: Based on the quotation from Marlowe's "doctor Faustus" ("had I as many souls as there be stars id give them all for Mephistopheles. By him I'll be great emperor of the world") this sculpture battles the argument of whether mankind is over crazed for power and knowledge of whether art can fill these spaces in man's desire by giving intuition and understanding.

Becky Lewis: Physical destruction.

My work will explore the destruction of the physical form. Looking at the anatomy of plants, animals etc. and what happens when parts are missing or destroyed.

Caroline Bayorunaite: I am basing my work on the idea of melancholy, detachment and the unconsciousness. I'm mainly focusing on painting, imagery and text combined together to create a sense of the theme mentioned above.

Dan Bell: Perception.

As an artist I try to create work around what I see is socially wrong or unjustified, I enjoy working with the social aspect in my work because I feel I can draw inspiration from practically anywhere. One of the main influences for my idea was a book called 'the Ways Of Seeing' By John Berger, the way people can look at an image and see it differently, 'seeing comes before words. The child looks and recognizes before it speaks' I want to create stories around work that may or may not be true, I like looking at the way people can perceive an idea or image. I'm hoping to create something modern and more contemporary then what I have done in the past, through installation work, light and digital as these are more contemporary mediums rather than conventional mediums.

Iain Metcalfe:

My work explores the roots of drug addiction in an expressive emotive way using text and paint to achieve this. I make use of Buddhist influences as well as a personal imagery to achieve this. The art has a raw emotional and expressive feel to it with a childlike innocence in the painting style but not upon the approach to the subject matter.




Exhibition Statement





The Work

Currently I am exploring a small part of the broad subject mental illness and the effects that it has upon a person, looking at depression and how people with depression try and mask it up and hide away from modern society, also portraying the absence and emptiness left behind.. I have put together an oil painting to show my process, Using the black space where the face should be as a form of mask as if the figure is hiding from society and then using the drips as a form of them trying to fight through the condition they have. using my twin brother as the sitter I felt

more of an emotional attachment to the painting, it brought the piece more to life for me at least. I felt like I had to capture part of him in the painting, which is why the jumper comes into play as its something that reminds me of him, the jumper also brings a more dampening feel to the painting as the colours are rather dull anddepressing. I feel with it being quite a dark subject matter my best medium was to use paint as I am most comfortable with it and it gives the piece more of a renascence feel.








Becky Lewis

My work explores the destruction of the physical form. Looking at the anatomy of plant, animals, humans etc and what happens when parts are missing or destroyed.

My first piece consists of a large number of hanging paper pieces that represent the single bones which make up the spine I stained them so they wouldn't look as clean and crisp. I want my work to show destruction so I burned parts of each one to make them all individual and destroyed in their own unique way. I considered laying them on the floor or placing them on the wall but I wanted the work to be uncomfortable to look at so I put them high up meaning the viewer has to strain to look at them.



The second piece I did is a series of A4 pieces which show the destruction of other joints and bones that make up the human body. I destroyed them in the same way but tried to make them a little worse however not too bad that you could no longer tell what the represent.










India Potesta

My work started off exploring the relationship between humans and earth, and how we abuse it. The deeper I looked into it, the more I realised the way humanity abuses each other and it's planet to get what it wants I.e. Starting wars for oil rather than freedom fighting. It occurred to me that similar to the play Dr Faustus, mankind was capable of doing the very thing we were created not to do - we damage the earth not protect it, thus trading our souls to the devil in turn.




Richard Cassidy



Lewis Swain

Using almost forgotten methods of print-based photography, absence of image is the focus of the pieces I have created. The audience feels the necessity and yet lack of literal imagery, thus developing a sense of discomfort regarding the work. The scale of the prints and the nature of their hanging enables an immersive space giving the audience uneasiness; they feel trapped and somewhat claustrophobic when seeing the work from inside. As an installed piece relying on the position of the viewer for it to truly be seen, it is successful in that it becomes interactive, thereby bringing the audience closer to the work and making it feel more personal to each individual.
